


## Recent PVS Achievements in LEBANON

## Strengths

- High number Issue of regulatory texts and technical decisions
- unique competent Authority for AH & welfare
- At central & local (regional)levels
- Existing of veterinary syndicate

## Weaknesses

- Human & Financial resources
- Training & Communication
- Alignement of Legislation with international standard
- No multi-year budget for priority animal diseases surveillance, control & eradication plan
- Lack of accredited reference AH lab

- 1. International recognition: SPS and EU standards (new drafted veterinary law)
- 2. Reorganization of the ARD
- 3. Consumers' trust / trust in food and animal trade
- 4. Economic development of husbandry /zoonosis decrease
